

Honestly, I'm tired of this endless parade of essay-writing, pseudo-opposition intellectuals.

Every day they produce "analyses," interpret the news, and strike strategic poses, writing as if Henry Kissinger himself had been their PhD advisor—yet they have never even read the Constitution of the Islamic Republic.

Or if they have read it, they didn't understand it; and if they did understand it, they lack the courage to say it out loud.

Any protest, discourse, article, or commentary that does not explicitly tie the root of Iran's misery to this clerical constitution, and does not clearly demand the formation of a Constituent Assembly and a change of the constitution, is neither political insight nor resistance. It is nothing more than refined political nonsense—intellectual yogurt-churning—designed to fill space and further exhaust a nation that is already nauseated by these hollow performances.

I am going to visit White house website and from now on, I am going to write only to President Trump.

This is what I wrote today:

For more than twenty years, through my Senators in Illinois, I have written letters, emails, and sent my books about Iran to American officials. I always asked them to do one simple thing: read the Constitution of the Islamic Republic of Iran.

Very few ever did.

That constitution matters. It is not theory. It is the regime's operating manual. Inside it are eight clear clauses that openly call for exporting revolution, confronting the United States, and attacking American interests worldwide. Iran's behavior is not a mystery — it is written in black and white.

I do not know whether your Iran advisors have ever seriously read that document. Based on my experience, most policymakers never have.

I understand that letters sent to you may not reach your desk and that I may receive a formal reply with your signature. I appreciate that and am grateful for the acknowledgment.

With your permission, starting now, I intend to write to you once a week with one short question:

"Have you read the Constitution of the Islamic Republic of Iran and seen the eight clauses that mandate terrorism against U.S. interests?"

I will keep asking this question — respectfully and persistently — until the end of your third term, hoping one day to hear a clear answer:

“Yes. I have read Iran’s constitution, and I will impose smart, targeted sanctions on the Ayatollahs’ oligarchs until those eight clauses are removed.”

That single step would do more to confront the regime than decades of failed diplomacy.
