

Subject: The Most Valuable Asset of the Ayatollahs

Dear Mr. President,

Yesterday, you made a powerful and important statement when you declared that the United States will target the valuable assets of the Ayatollahs.

You are absolutely correct. The clerical regime in Iran has accumulated enormous wealth through corruption, sanctions evasion, and control of state institutions.

But respectfully, their most valuable asset is not their money.

Their most valuable asset is their Constitution.

The Constitution of the Islamic Republic is the legal fortress that protects their entire system of power. Through it, the doctrine of Velayat-e Faqih places absolute authority in the hands of one unelected cleric and shields the regime from accountability to the Iranian people.

For more than twenty years, the doctrine of Cyrus Force, together with its followers inside Iran, has focused on two fundamental demands:

- 1- The formation of a Constituent Assembly to rewrite Iran's Constitution.
- 2- Smart U.S. sanctions designed to compel the regime to accept constitutional reform.

During these two decades, many opposition figures abroad have argued endlessly about whether Iran should become a monarchy or a republic. These debates have only divided the opposition and distracted from the central issue.

Meanwhile, inside Iran, the political consciousness of the people has evolved.

The Green Movement of 2009, the Statement of Fourteen Activists in 2019, and the Woman, Life, Freedom movement have gradually pushed the national conversation toward a fundamental realization:

Iran's crisis cannot be solved without rewriting the Constitution.

Last year, even Mr. Mir-Hossein Mousavi, together with eight hundred of activists and professors, called for the formation of a Constituent Assembly and constitutional reform. Seventeen Courageous women such as Nasrin Sotoudeh and Narges Mohammadi have publicly supported the same demand.

Today, this idea is becoming the dominant political discourse inside Iran.

Mr. President,

The Iranian nation has experienced two revolutions in the last century.

The first created a constitutional monarchy.

The second allowed Ruhollah Khomeini to impose the Islamic Republic.

The Iranian people will not make the same mistake a third time by choosing a king or a president first and writing a constitution later.

That decision must belong to a freely elected Constituent Assembly representing the Iranian people.

If the United States truly wishes to target the regime's most valuable asset, the strategic objective should be clear:

Pressure the regime to surrender its constitution and accept the formation of a Constituent Assembly.

Such a strategy would weaken the regime at its very foundation while avoiding war and empowering the Iranian people to determine their own future.

Mr. President, you have often demonstrated the courage to challenge entrenched systems that others consider untouchable.

The constitution of the Ayatollahs is exactly such a system.

If that constitution falls, the entire system of the Ayatollahs will fall with it — and history will remember that it happened under your leadership.
